Aesthetics In 'This is England' [&] 'Trainspotting'

<u>Social realism</u> (This is England)

- Knife shows violent and forceful nature of gangs
- Brick walls with graffiti shows urbane and unprivileged lifestyle in area
- Eyelines show major power imbalance between the two



<u>Social realism</u> (Trainspotting)

- Cigarette in hand emphasizes the addiction towards drugs
- The two men standing above the dealer ominously threatening
- People's stature in this scene are calm, showing that acts like this aren't uncommon.



<u>Colour grading</u> (This is England)

- Green hue shows the sick minded nature of Combo's gang
- Red and black graffiti pops out showing harshness and violence
- Everything else is desaturated showing that Combo's gang have distanced themselves from everything else



<u>Colour grading</u> (Trainspotting)

- The red lighting and monotone scheme of the room is iconic to the Mother Superior
- Red giving off sense of danger, not pleasant
- Green showing the ill nature of the drugs
- Blue emanating the sadness Renton is trying to get rid of



<u>Bathos</u> (This is England)

- Vast tonal shift from threatening to friendly
- Builds suspense in audience, and ends with a thankful anticlimax
- Shows audience the potential of how threatening combo's gang could be





<u>Bathos</u> (Trainspotting)

- Vast tonal shift from horrifying to ironic and unbelievable
- More drugs completely diverts from what the audience would expect
- From the suspenseful silence to Renton preparing drugs almost makes the audience forget the weight of the situation
