### Sets



This is the set for Rick's Café, and is the most popular café in Casablanca, and is made to look very exotic, and a large communion place as it is always very busy. This would've been shot inside a studio, which helps control the lighting.

## Location



This location is designed to represents the exotic market of Casablanca, and was specifically made to look like a foreign country as the real Casablanca was impossible to get to with the war currently taking place.



This scene was shot in the Van Nuys Airport, which resembles the Lockheed Electra for the ending of the film. Fog is used to create an eerie atmosphere, but also to help mask the unconvincing cardboard plane.

### Costumes
