# Lesson: Using the Photomerge tool in Photoshop.

## This lesson you:

**Must:** use the Photomerge tool in Photoshop to produce a merged image in the style of David Hockney.

**Should:** Try using the drop shadow tool to create a sense of depth in your work.

**Could:** put your new photographs into contact sheets and begin making a mini A01 sheet.

#### Hockney's Photomontages:









David Hockney often arranged his photographs by overlapping them, as to tell a story.

Hockney also arranged his Photomontages by placing them neatly next to one another in a grid.




#### Using Photomerge:

- 1. Open Photoshop.
- **2.** Click the **File** menu, point to **Automate**, and then click **Photomerge**.
- **3.** Click the **Use** list arrow, and then select from the following options:
- \* **Files.** Select the files to be included in the merge document. Click the Browse button, and then select images.
- \* Folder. Select the folder that contains all of the images.
- \* Open Files. Select the currently open Photoshop images.
- **4.** Once images are selected click Ok and your images will be Photomerged.
